Our Journey



us a flower. It was nothing more than a common pink flower, but we loved it.



We Googled, spoke to other growers, and experimented—everything I guess that you may have done or are doing.

Our biggest learning curve was trial and error. In the beginning we lost hundreds of seedlings simply because we didn't understand a few crucial points (I will talk about this in more depth later). We had been in the nursery industry for years, we knew about growing plants in pots—it was our business to know!—yet we had never before come across a plant that did not want to flourish under our care (in a traditional nursery) and grow as we expected it to grow. This little darling preferred a bit of neglect, which is the exact opposite of what most plant requirements are in garden centres.

And test our knowledge and patience she did. Most plants grown under nursery conditions are kept moist and fertilised often, all to keep them looking their best for customers to come along and buy. That is how it is done. It was a proven formula to maximise profit and was being duplicated thousands of times in nurseries and garden centres across Australia.

We had reached a critical point. If we wanted to continue to grow Adenium plants, we *had* to change our thinking. It was as simple as that! We had to forget what we knew about growing plants in the traditional nursery scene and start afresh.

We are still on our learning journey but happy to say that we don't kill so many plants now!
